

FINDING ARTICLES FROM HAWAII NEWSPAPERS

When you search in the online newspapers, remember to put phrases in quotation marks, e.g.: "**alien species**" or "**water rights**." You usually don't have to include the word "Hawaii" as part of your search term, since these are local newspapers and most of the articles will be about Hawaii.



STAR-ADVERTISER <http://staradvertiser.com>

The *Star-Advertiser* has a search box in the upper-right corner of its Web pages. **It will ONLY search for articles written since the *Star-Advertiser* began, which is June 7, 2010.** (On their Archives page, there is a way to search for older articles from the *Honolulu Advertiser* or the *Star-Bulletin*, but you have to pay for them.)

The *Star-Advertiser* has links at the top and bottom of each article for putting articles into printer-friendly format or to email them.

IF YOU ARE LOOKING FOR A PARTICULAR DAY'S PAPER:

On the Archives page of the *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* are links to back issues of both the *Honolulu Advertiser* and the *Star-Bulletin*, as well as back issues of the *Star-Advertiser* itself. Click on the "Archive" link under the search box (or on the "Back Issues" link under the "Home" tab at the top). Or go to <http://www.staradvertiser.com/archives>.

The back issues of the *Honolulu Advertiser* go back to 2001, and the back issues of the *Star-Bulletin* go back to 1996.



HONOLULU WEEKLY <http://honoluluweekly.com>

The *Honolulu Weekly* does not have a search engine of its own. However, you can search in it as follows:

Go to **Google** and click on **Advanced Search**.

On the Advanced Search page, down in the **Domain** section, type **honoluluweekly.com**.

Enter your search term/s at the top.

Note: The *Honolulu Weekly* does not have any printer-friendly or email links.

The *Honolulu Weekly* also keeps some back issues on their Web site. They don't keep full back issues, but they have a section where they keep their cover stories from past issues. From the "News" pull-down menu at the top, select "Cover Stories" – they are listed in reverse chronological order.



Note: Not ALL the articles in the print papers are in the online versions—but almost all locally written stories are, and some mainland or international newswire stories are.



TO CITE ONLINE NEWSPAPER ARTICLES IN EASYBIB:

In EasyBib, choose the **Newspaper** tab at the top. Then click on **Manual Entry**. Then choose the **Online** tab (instead of "In Print"). Fill out the boxes, with EasyBib open in one browser tab and your online newspaper article open in another tab, so you can go back and forth between the two.
